What is bullying?

Learning to understand and manage conflict is an important part of growing up. Bullying is not simply a 'falling out'. Research shows that experiencing bullying can have a significant impact on a child's life well into adulthood. To ensure we are able to prevent bullying, act quickly when it takes place and avoid misidentifying bullying, it is vital that schools and other settings have a shared definition of bullying. This should be understood by the whole school or setting including parents, young people and all staff.

Our definition of bullying

Bullying is the repetitive, intentional hurting of one person or group by another person or group, where the relationship involves an imbalance of power. Bullying can be physical, verbal or psychological. It can happen face-to-face or online'.

What Happens at Holy Trinity when bullying is reported?

Core to our Behaviour Policy, is our continuous work towards being a Federation free of all forms of bullying. At Holy Trinity, we have a zero-tolerance approach to bullying. Any reports of bullying are reported to the Senior Leadership Team – either the Executive Headteacher or the Deputy Headteacher and are fully investigated in line with the school behaviour policy. Parents are communicated with and headteacher appointments are organised as a matter of priority. As part of our behaviour policy, restorative practice is used with all involved in order to support pupils in understanding the impact and consequence of actions.

Supporting Neurodiversity

Embodying our school vision of 'Loved by God and one another, Holy Trinity is a welcoming community of faith, where we learn and flourish together' we welcome a diverse community of children and families into our school. Whether it is diversity in our backgrounds, our personal experiences or neurodiversity, enabling all of our children to learn from and with each other ensures aspiration for all.



Most of our children's needs are well met by high quality teaching and learning in class and the universal pastoral support the teachers and TAs offer daily in their classrooms. Some children need extra help in some areas and may be included in interventions. Fewer children will need a personal plan with targets and some additional provision which is different to their peers. Very few of our children receive individualised support through an

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Education Health and Care Plan and with this support comes an increased level of personalisation and external agency involvement to support us in including everyone in our Trinity community. If you have any concerns about your child or the support they may require either at home or in school, please speak to your child's teacher in the first instance. In addition I am contactable in person (on the playground at drop offs/ pick ups) or via email. 
School Uniform
